From Our Minister: The Rev. Rali Weaver



Do you remember the Y2K hysteria approaching January of 2000? 2020 seems to have fit into the imaginations of several science fiction authors, making futuristic science fiction novels soon to be out of date. This does not create the same crisis as the Millennium Bug, or offer any reason for hysteria, but it can give us some pause. Are we where we wanted to be as we approach 2020? The answers might be different, whether speaking from the personal, professional, cultural or spiritual realm.

Did you think by now we would have reduced our reliance on fossil fuels? Did you expect drones to be around every corner? Are you surprised how ineffective public

transportation continues to be or that we haven't quite fixed the wealth and inequality disparity? Not to mention the power of the NRA? Or the ever-present racism in our country. There are countless ways we might weigh and measure our progress against the utopian ideals set forth for this time. I imagine that we all feel some disconnect between our ideals and the real world as we approach the new year.

From our Director of Religious Education: Grace Peña

On Sunday 9/15/2019 we launched the new church year of our Children's Religious Education program with a "Pancake Breakfast Kick-Off" with almost all of the classes (except for OWL 7-9 which had to start its workshops that same day in order to fit all of the remaining workshops into this last term). The kids cooked (which they always LOVE to do) and served the food. This was a great idea by Rali with a great recipe from Dale Meyer-Curley. Liza Arend helped out, too. We will definitely do this again next year.

Our classes in the 2019-2020 are as follows: Nursery (Infants & toddlers), Spirit Play (3 yr. olds-Kindergarten), UU Explorers (1st-4th grades), Worship Leaders (5th & 6th grades), and Our Whole Lives (O.W.L.) 7-9.

Starting at the end of January 2020 we will also have: Neighboring Faiths (6th grade), Our Whole Lives Kindergarten-1st Grade and Coming of Age.

Alexas and Desi continue as our caregivers in Nursery.

We have a lot of new kids in *Spirit Play* this year. As it is a much larger class I have moved them into the larger room upstairs and put the Nursery in the smaller room. The R.E. Committee and I have talked about how to structure this class a little differently to accommodate for the larger amount of children. We want them to continue to feel safe, follow the structure of the curriculum, learn a little about our UU Principles and have fun. I hope to get all of the parents of the students in this class to teach at some point.

The *U.U. Explorers* will continue to explore our 7 Principles and 6 Sources through activities, stories and discussion. I will mainly teach this class through January 2020 along with parents who sign up to teach. *Worship Leaders* will continue to participate in our intergenerational services. Since this is the 2nd year for most of the class, they will be assisting with more aspects of service as Miranda Grady did on Sunday 9/29 with the telling of the Children's Message. *OWL* 7-9 has the 2nd half of its curriculum. Allison Staton, Joshua Langmead, Lisa Pilat and Tyler Carpenter continue as the facilitators for this class. At the end of January this class becomes *Coming of Age* which I will be teaching along with Lisa Pilat and Paquita Bass (leaving *U.U. Explorers* to the parents).

Cindy Jones will come back at the end of January to teach *Neighboring Faiths*. I do not have a current co-teacher for that class, but may use a combination of the parents of the children in this class to work with Cindy.v *Worship Leaders* will then become a smaller class since most of the class will move into *Neighboring Faiths*. *Worship Leaders* will continue to participate in inter-generational services.

Lastly, there will be *OWL K-1* with Kerrie Gallagher and Tom Donaghey teaching (January–May).

My plan for youth groups is to continue keeping the Middle School Youth Group mainly at church with different activities such as movie nights, cooking, game night, etc. I will take on some of the times we get together followed by a night where the parents help out. I hope to have more success with the High School Youth Group. They are all so busy most of the time so I think I will try to include more events/activities outside of church for them.

From Our Music Director: Darry Dolezal

Concerts at First Church will present its second concert of the 2019–2020 season featuring highly acclaimed classical guitarist John Muratore in a solo concert at First Church and Parish Dedham on Saturday November 9rd, 2019 at 7:30 pm. There will be a reception with Mr. Muratore immediately following the concert in the dining room. Tickets are \$20 for general admission and \$15 for students and seniors, available at the door and online at www.firstchurchconcerts.org.

The Boston Musical Intelligencer recently said "Muratore is surely one of greater Boston's most gifted guitar virtuosos, and his broad range of repertoire is one of his most valuable attributes." Mr. Muratore regularly performs as a solo recitalist, concerto soloist and chamber musician extensively throughout the United States, Canada, Europe and Russia. He has collaborated with numerous chamber ensembles including Emmanuel Music, the Spectrum Singers, Chorus Pro Musica, Alea III, Boston Musica Viva and Counterpoint. Recent appearances as concerto soloist have been with the Ridgefield Symphony, Vermont Symphony and Symphony by the Sea under the direction of Jonathan McPhee.

The Boston Globe has described him as "a fleet-fingered and musicianly performer" and has characterized his playing as…"unleashing so many different varieties of tone and color in quick succession…a kind of aural iridescence." John's live performances have often been featured on NPR and WGBH Radio's Classical Performances, and he has recorded for Albany, Pont Nuef and Arabesque Records.

Mr. Muratore is an active educator in classical guitar and is on the faculty at Boston University, Dartmouth College and is the coordinator of the guitar program at the All Newton Music School.

First Church and Parish Dedham Unitarian Universalist was first gathered in 1638 and is located in Dedham Center. Its lively music program includes its choir at Sunday services, the Parish Players theater group and the **Concerts at First Church** concert series.

We continue to have parishioners who are not feeling well and/or cannot make it to church and would love to receive a call, a card or a visit.



Our November 3rd Visiting Minister:

Cited by Bill McKibben as "one of the true stalwarts in the fight against climate change" and "one of the key figures in the religious environmental surge," Rev. Fred Small is Minister for Climate Justice at Arlington Street Church, Boston (http://ascboston.org/). He serves on the Steering Committee of the Faith Science Alliance for Climate Leadership (http://faithsciencealliance.org).

A Unitarian Universalist parish minister for nearly two decades, Fred is also a singer-songwriter and environmental lawyer. In 2015 he

left parish ministry to devote his energies to creation care and climate advocacy.

Fred has studied with some of the wisest spiritual teachers of our time, including Thich Nhat Hanh, Eknath Easwaran, Joanna Macy, John Philip Newell, and Tara Brach. In 2018, Fred earned his Certificate in Spiritual Guidance from the Rowe Center. He is a member of Spiritual Directors International.

Educated at Yale (BA 1974) and the University of Michigan (JD and MS in Natural Resources 1978), Fred served as a staff attorney for the Conservation Law Foundation. In 1980, Fred left CLF to tour internationally as a folksinger and songwriter, releasing seven albums over two decades (http://rounder.com/). Pete Seeger called him "one of America's best songwriters." In 1999, Fred earned his MDiv from Harvard Divinity School, was ordained as a Unitarian Universalist minister, and began serving First Church Unitarian in Littleton, Massachusetts. In 2008, he was called by First Parish in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

One of the first to engage in civil disobedience to draw attention to climate change, Rev. Small was arrested with 21 others in prayer outside the US Department of Energy in Washington, DC, in May 2001. In 2007, he was one of the lead organizers of the Interfaith Walk for Climate Rescue from Northampton to Boston, Massachusetts. In 2016, he was twice arrested with other faith leaders in nonviolent civil disobedience protesting construction of Spectra Energy's fracked gas pipeline in West Roxbury, Massachusetts.

In 2007, Grist Magazine named Rev. Small one of 15 Green Religious Leaders worldwide (http://www.grist.org/news/maindish/2007/07/24/religious/). In the July 26, 2015, issue of Boston Globe Magazine, Bill McKibben highlighted Rev. Small's leadership in religious climate

(https://www.bostonglobe.com/magazine/2015/07/25/what-religion-can-teach-climate-scientists/LAZYZ6DBVHr1THqvWFXffO/story.html#). In 2017, UU Mass Action honored him with the Ruth Rowan Award for his musical contributions to social justice movements.

Minutes reviewed. Dave noted that the Parish Committee Chairs have taken care of the signature cards at Dedham Savings Bank. Minutes were approved without changes.

Treasurer's Report

Income to date: 10.01 % of budgeted Pledges: 18.81% of budget

Most expenses are in line with budget. Full details are in the Treasurer's Report that was

reviewed and approved.

Photographer for the Church Directory came out of publicity and membership.

Cindy is working with Grace to get her pension program set up.

Cindy is coordinating with Erik Meyer-Curley the transition of the Treasurer's responsibilities. They plan to work together for the next few months as this transition progresses.

It was recommended that we consider an outside audit of church funds, perhaps every five years. The cost of this type of audit would be between \$2,000 and \$5,000.

Minister's Report

Jane Kelly is dealing with a recurrence of cancer

New computer for the office. Rali wants to use \$500. from a gift she received for this purchase, plus \$300 from church funds.

Grace and Rali will work to clean up the office and the playground. The full Minister's Report in in Dropbox.

Building Projects

The summer building projects have been delayed.

Meeting House painting is scheduled to begin on the 12th of August. The carpentry repairs and painting of the Parish House will be postponed until next summer.

The installation of the solar panels has also been delayed due to permitting issues. We have also had to address and resolve transformed capacity issues. Installation is now planned for October

and will require coordination with the church office and Baystate Learning as this will be a time when there is much more activity in the building than there is during summer months.

<u>Congregational Endorsement for Social Justice Issues/Environmental Issues (Green New Deal)</u>

Jen Atkins and Allison Staton reported on this issue.

It was a general discussion with the following points noted:

- 1. Our 501C3 non-profit status precludes the church from supporting individual political candidates, but allows for advocacy and support of different issues.
- 2. Advocacy can include the support of Legislation. (St. Suzanna's endorsed Yes on Ballot Question #3 in the last election and they have been very supportive of Immigrant protection.)
- 3. Needham does not have Parish Committee authorization to take a stand representing the Church on different issues. They require congregational dialogue and possibly a congregational vote.
- 4. The church can definitely provide a format to educate people about issues, such as the Green New Deal.

Committee For Parish Concerns

Andrea presented a draft of a mission statement for this new Committee and received a number of comments. It was agreed that the statement would be revised and reviewed at the October Parish Committee meeting. The goal is to introduce this new committee at the Fall All-Church Meeting.
